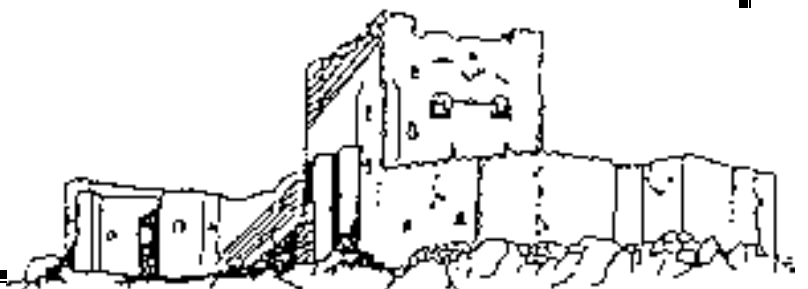

FLOWER SHOW, SATURDAY 15TH AUGUST, 2009

THE SHOW

The aim of the Show is to encourage and stimulate interest in the production of flowers, fruit and vegetables, and to demonstrate the excellent results obtainable from well managed gardens.

RULES

These rules will be strictly enforced and exhibitors are advised in their own interests to study them before making their entries and staging their exhibits.

1. Entry forms may be forwarded in advance to the Show Secretary together with the entry fee of 20p for each exhibit. (Maximum entry fee £2.00). The closing date for the receipt of postal entries will be Thursday, 13th August, 2009.
2. Entries in all classes **except the Allotment Class** will also be accepted up to 10.45 a.m. on the day of the Show on payment of the entry fee of 30p per exhibit. (Maximum entry fee £3.00).
3. All exhibits with the exception of classes 114-119 & 132 (floral art) and 139 – 148 (preserves) must have been grown by the exhibitor in his/her own garden and he/she must sign the declaration to this effect contained in the Entry Form.
4. The Committee shall have power to inspect the garden of any exhibitor before or after the Show.
5. Only amateurs may compete for prizes. An amateur shall be understood to be one who does not engage professionally in relation to the produce or craft covered by any class in this schedule.
6. The hall will be open for staging from 8 a.m. and judging will commence at 11.30 a.m. sharp. ALL exhibits must be on the stages where they are to be judged thirty minutes before that time.
7. Exhibitors will receive, on application to the Show Secretary at the Hall on the morning of the Show, their Exhibitors' Cards, which must be placed on their exhibits previous to the judging.
8. Exhibitors are requested to name all exhibits and cards for this purpose will be available from the Show Secretary. While errors in naming will not disqualify, the judges will take correctness and clearness in naming into account in the event of close competition.
9. While the use of artificial or mechanical support is permitted in cut flowers classes, the Judges may, at their discretion, deduct points from blooms so supported.
10. All exhibits must be staged according to the directions of the stewards appointed by the Committee.
11. **No person will be allowed in the hall during the time of judging except those officially engaged. Exhibitors will be allowed back into the hall at 1.30 pm (provided judging has finished).**
12. Any competitor making a false declaration or attempting to deceive the Judges shall forfeit all prize moneys and entry fees.
13. An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any class unless otherwise stated.
14. One First, one Second and one Third prize will ordinarily be awarded in any class but may be withheld at the discretion of the Judge if the exhibits are considered unworthy of the prize offered.
15. An exhibitor may be awarded more than one prize in any class unless otherwise stated. All points earned will count towards allocation of trophies.

16. Cup or trophy classes for the highest number of points - in the event of a tie, the cup or trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the greatest number of first prizes.
17. The decision of the judges will be final as to merit. Any other points of dispute should be lodged in writing with the Show Secretary before 4 p.m. on the day of the Show, together with a deposit of 50p which will be forfeited if the appeal is not sustained.
18. **Prize giving will take place at approx 3.30 p.m. No exhibits may be removed from the show benches until after presentation of the trophies.**
19. It would be appreciated by the Committee if Exhibitors would allow their entries to be sold for the benefit of the Society. **The sale of such entries will take place after presentation of trophies. An Exhibitor who has entries which he/she does not wish to sell should obtain "Not For Sale" cards from the Show Secretaries during the afternoon of the Show. Entries in Section 4 - Pot Plants, Section 5 - Floral Art, Section 6 - Novice Floral Art, Section 7 - Children's Classes, Section 8 - Preserves and Section 9 - Handicrafts are automatically reserved unless specifically donated by the Exhibitor.**
20. Successful Exhibitors will receive prize money from the Treasurer before the Show closes on presentation of their Award Cards. Money not claimed will be deemed to be donated.
21. The Committee will not be responsible for damage to exhibits during the Show nor for the loss of any article, but all reasonable care will be taken.

Garden News Top Tray Rules 2009

The Garden News Top Tray class is for a collection of three types of vegetables taken from the following list of eight. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets and each type must consist of the same variety:

Carrots (3), Cauliflowers (2), Onions (3), Parsnips (3), Peas (6 pods), Potatoes (3), Runner Beans (6 pods), Tomatoes (6).

Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: 7 points for size, shape and colour. 7 points for condition, 6 points for uniformity. The overall mark will therefore be out a total of 60.

All vegetables are to be displayed for effect.

The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 18in x 24in (45cm x 60cm), without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray or board measuring 18in by 24in (45cm x 60cm) can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 18in x 24in (45cm x 60cm).

A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing, but no other foliage or accessories, such as plates, sand or rings, will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

The winner of the Garden News Top Tray class will receive a special certificate and a £10 D.T. Brown voucher. The runner up will receive a certificate plus a £5 D.T. Brown voucher. Third place will receive a certificate plus a £3 D.T. Brown voucher. They are to be used by December 31 2009, with any seed order - non-seed products cannot be purchased with the vouchers. They are valid for mail order only.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- ❖ Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 3in (7.5cm)
- ❖ Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached
- ❖ Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces. (the green flower bud case)
- ❖ Judges may handle exhibits, open pods and so on to check for quality
- ❖ The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all – such as cutting holes for standing onions in
- ❖ Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Tray class, remembering that entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors
- ❖ The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards
- ❖ **Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by the show officials**

Vase Rules 2009

- The Garden News Top Vase class is for a vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between five and ten stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different KINDS of plants; two varieties of the same plant are NOT two kinds.
- Only fresh HOME-GROWN flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed.
- The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.
- Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries will be allowed.
- The vase can be any shape or size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
- No accessories whatsoever – such as bows and additional foliage – will be allowed. Foliage, which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, will be allowed. Packing material – including floral foam – to keep the stems in place is allowed.
- The winner of the Garden News Top Vase class will receive a special certificate and a £10 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher. The runner up will receive a certificate plus a £5 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher. Third place will receive a certificate plus a £3 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher. They are to be used by December 31 2009, with any seed order – non-seed products cannot be purchased with this voucher. They are valid for mail order only.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- ❖ Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant. The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera. For instance pinks, carnations and sweet william – which are all dianthus – would not be classed as different kinds.
- ❖ Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed.
- ❖ A vase by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- ❖ The Garden News Top Vase is open for anyone to enter and is not intended purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows.
- ❖ Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Vase class, bearing in mind that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors.
- ❖ Judges note the display has to be viewed all round.
- ❖ The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitor's cards.
- ❖ **Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.**

FAILURE TO ABIDE BY ANY OF THESE RULES WILL LEAD TO DISQUALIFICATION

SECTION 5 - FLORAL ART

An Exhibit is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories. Drapes, Mats and Bases allowed in all classes. Height is unlimited except where stated. Staging widths are set out in each class. Artificial plant material is not allowed.

- 114 "Colour with Candles" – a table centre exhibit. Not to exceed 18 inches in width.
- 115 "Box of Delights" - a miniature exhibit . Neither height or width to exceed 4 inches.
- 116 "Solitaire" - a petite exhibit using a single bloom, other fresh foliage permitted.
Neither height or width to exceed 9 inches.
- 117 "Treasures of the Earth" an exhibit in a basket using flowers, vegetables and/or fruit.
Neither height or width to exceed 2ft 6 inches.
- 118 "Colourful Contrasts". An exhibit of foliage. Not to exceed 18 inches in width.
- 119 "All things Bright & Beautiful"-an interpretative exhibit. Not to exceed 2 ft in width.

SECTION 6 – NOVICE

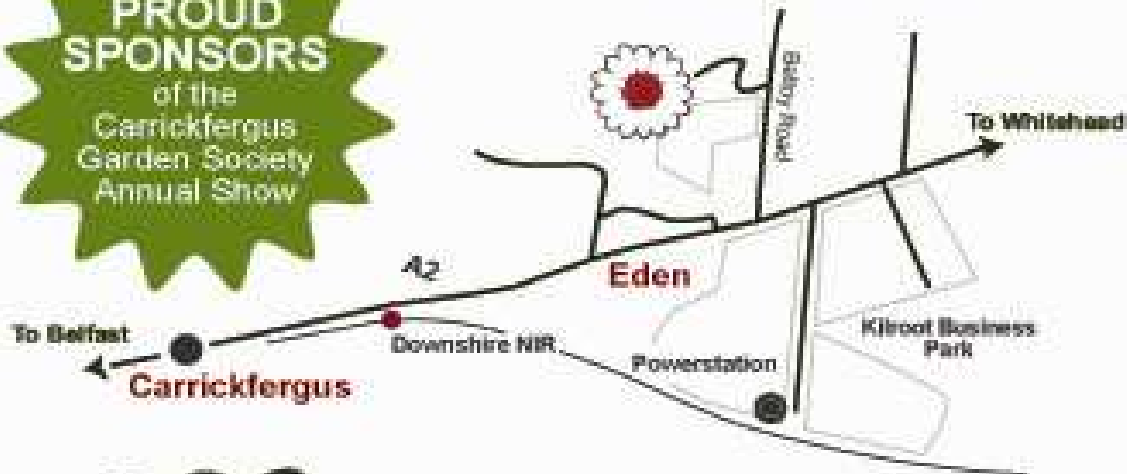
